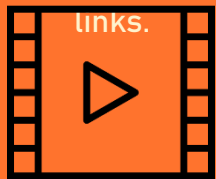


TIP #1

TIP #2

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION

After watching the videos, ask each staff member to reflect on the key messages (see below) of the videos, encourage your staff to write down their reflections.



KEY MESSAGES

- Corruption impacts the community, so it's okay to speak up about corruption
- You can report corruption to a law enforcement agency in your country
- The community wins when corruption is reported.

TIP #3

GROUP DISCUSSION

Ask each person to share their reflections of the videos, the below prompts may assist you to lead the discussion.



DISCUSSION PROMPTS

- What other ways can corruption occur?
- What other impacts does corruption have on the community?
- Why might people be hesitant to report corruption?

TIP #4

QUESTION & ANSWER

Your staff may have questions about whistleblowing and anti-corruption in your workplace, be prepared to provide the below information.



BE PREPARED TO SHARE

- What is your workplace policy on reporting anti-corruption?
- Does your country have a corruption reporting authority? If so, what are their contact details?

TIP #5

INVITE A GUEST SPEAKER

Invite your country's reporting authority to present at your workplace, ask them to give a presentation and hold a Q&A on the below points.

- How can I report corruption?
- Is reporting confidential and anonymous?
- What information should a reporting person provide to a whistleblowing authority?
